#### From the Secretary's Desk

"Death is natural and necessary, but not just. It is a random force of nature; survival is equally accidental. Each loss is an occasion to remember that survival is a gift." - Harriet McBryde Johnson

It was a warm, sunny day. I was supposed to meet lawnmower-man

up at the cemetery at noon to work on mowers. I waited until 12:30 pm and then set out to do the other things I needed to do. One of those things involved taking one of the zero-turn mowers to the Lafayette cemetery.

I talk about mowing at "the" cemetery a lot, but we are actually on the hook for two. The big, active one in McMinnville and a smaller, older one in Lafayette, a few miles up the road. It's no longer active (meaning that we don't bury people there anymore) but it does get some visitors on Memorial Day weekend. It probably gets more around Halloween as it is away from town, secluded, and notorious for some nonsensical association from the late 19th c. With the exceptions of Memorial Day weekend or pre-arranged appointments, the gate is locked and closed.

The earliest graves in the Lafayette Masonic Cemetery (that we know of) are 1851, shortly after the Lodge in Lafayette was chartered and only slightly longer after the town of Lafayette was founded (1846.) The cemetery itself is situated on the crown of a tree-ringed hill just outside of the town. It flows down the side of the hill about three-quarters of the way. The very top, laid out beneath a tall tree grove, was the "public burying ground" for the town back in the day. That's actually how it's listed on the plot maps that we have. Unfortunately, no detail accompanies them.

Lately, we've paid a landscaping crew to go up and string trim the whole place to get ready for Memorial Day. There's a ton of tree limbs that fall in the intervening year and a lot of stones that have toppled, either because of the tree-fall or thrill-seeking, juvenile people (of all ages.) That made us reluctant to try to mow. But this year, I figured I'd haul a

mower up and see how much I could get done safely and confidently.

As it turns out, quite a lot. I probably hit 75-80% with the mower in about 3.5 hrs. I got stuck once and had to trek out to get rope so I could drive the truck down the hill and pull the mower up to solid ground. That set the lower boundary and after that, it went okay. There were some areas that weren't safe on the mower or were too dense in stones. I made a dent, though.

The grass was an easy 3-4' tall in places and the mower wasn't the right tool, but it's the tool I had. (If all you have is a hammer, everything looks like a nail.) Four or five passes over the same ground to get it looking decent later and it worked out. Next time will be easier (I hope) and if I sharpen the blades, so much the better. We'll still need the trimming crew, but I suspect that I can cut the bill by 50-70% and that was the point.

My great triumph, however, turned sour on me around midway through the mowing. I made a pass down the hill through the tall grass and on the return pass saw a bunny in the new-mown grass that hadn't made it out in time. The blades didn't get him, but he was got, nonetheless.

I have hunted and I fish and I have exactly zero qualms about killing for a purpose and with intent. I'm less keen on doing so accidentally.

I found him a quiet, secluded spot down the hill and proceeded that much slower, hoping that the commotion of the slow procession would drive anybody else out well ahead of the machine.


