The Adventures of a Country Master Mason Abroad

Fraternal greetings,

As you may have noticed, I didn't


submit a column last month – things got a little busy around here. I was on the continent for a week, partly to explore France and Belgium. The main part of the trip, however, was to attend the unveiling of a monument to American soldiers killed in the Parroy Forest and participate in commemoration ceremonies for the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Lunévilleand Kriegsheim. A friend of my wife's family was in a unit that participated in each of those and was killed at Kriegsheim in 1944. Kathleen was representing his family, who were unable to attend, at the ceremonies.

This wasn't exactly Masonic work, but while in Strasbourg (near Kriegsheim) we stopped into a coffee shop which is situated in a sixteenth century building about fifty yards from the Cathedral. The spiral staircase is original and each of the stairs was carved by a Mason who left his mark. Nine individual masons have been identified and there is a placard on the ground floor that numbers each stair and both clusters and color-codes them based on the mason's mark. The first picture is part of the staircase with some of the marks visible. There are 89 stairs; the placard is visible below.

The second image is a close-up of part of the key. Each number is an index to a stair on the main diagram. The top mark is associated with 13 stairs; the bottom mark is associated with 23 stairs. It's not clear why the mason who carved stair 85 was responsible for only one. As is usual, names aren't known and can't be associated with the individual marks.



After returning from France, I was home for a few days and then showed up in the States for a bit. I had to renew my drivers license and managed a surprise visit to Lodge since the trip overlapped. It was great getting to sit in my Mother Lodge with the Mc-Minnville Brethren again. Sadly I didn't get to see everyone and I had to leave shortly after. Hopefully some folks will be able to come over when I take the Chair as Master of Cabot Lodge in Bristol in 2021.

Masonically, the rest of the year is busy - I'm currently SD in Cabot Lodge. Next year I'm jumping to SW so I'm learning all that work, which is somewhat more substantial than Oregon ritual. I was installed as 2nd Assistant Sojourner in Royal Arch Chapter last week - a little floor work and one line. I'm not committing to anything progressive outside of Craft Lodge and I'm trying to limit my joining activities. With reading and writing, other obligations of the Ph.D. program, and the occasional visit somewhere interesting ... that's plenty. We're combining a couple of those things in December when we travel to the Czech Republic to attend the wedding of good friends, one of whom is finishing up his Ph.D. this year related to early Masonic aprons (early 18th c.) and the visual symbolism represented by them. He's also a Brother in the Province of Bristol at Brunel Lodge. In November, I'll be attending an Emulation Ritual demonstration here in Bristol. Emulation is the most common ritual form used in the English Constitution, but it's not the only one. Bristol ritual is unique and there are four or five other variations throughout the country.

Elections are coming up this month (November) there in McMinnville. Good luck to all the Brethren standing for positions. Don't forget to come to Lodge and ballot if you can.

Next month, we'll explore other types of marks that are confused with or wrongly associated with Mason's marks.

Gomez is a member and Past Master (2012) of Atlas Pythagoras Lodge No. 10 located in


