Tidings from the East!

I have a calendar, a Word document really, where I jot down important Masonic dates when I come across them. Looking at it recently, I saw that October was a busy month for establishing things. Five Grand Lodges (that I know of) were established during this month including the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma (October5th, 1874), the Grand Lodge of Virginia (October 14, 1778), the Grand Lodge of Vermont (October 15th, 1794), the Grand Lodge of Kentucky (October 16, 1800), the Grand Lodge of the State of Israel (October 20th, 1953.) The Philalethes Society, an independent Masonic research society, was established on October 1st, 1928. [This is as good a place as any to put a plug in for the Philalethes Society and the Lodges of Research – if you have any interest in a more formal, academic pursuit of Light in Masonry, both of these bodies could use your effort and support and both have a lot to give in that regard.]

I have a couple notes related to a different kind of "establishing." Two Presidents had their Entered Apprentice degrees conferred upon them: Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt in (October 11, 1911 – Holland Lodge #3, New York) and Lyndon B. Johnson (October 30, 1937 – somewhere deep in the heart of Texas.) And, finally, on October 14th, 1989 the first official recognition of Prince Hall Masonry by a Grand Lodge was granted by the Grand Lodge of Connecticut. This wasn't the first attempt to recognize Prince Hall Masonry, but it was the first that survived subsequent challenges and changes in Grand Lodge composition and became the driver for several others.

Looking at our own calendar, we have our own bit of "establishing" to do sometime soon – we have a candidate who has been initiated and passed, who is ready to give proficiency and be raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason.

"Establish" comes from the Latin adjective "stabilis" (stable) which became the verb "stabilere" (to make firm.) When we confer the degrees and help candidates to make their way through them, coaching and mentoring and supporting them as we can, we are participating in a process of making them firm in the Light of Freemasonry. We accept them at their weakest and least illuminated as Entered Apprentices. We imbue them with some knowledge and Light on the way to becoming Fellowcrafts. And then we acknowledge their achievement and make them firm as Master Masons. The proficiencies that we require along the way serve as scaffolding to show both the Brethren and the Lodge that they are doing the work and will not topple.

Those proficiencies are echoes of our historical, operative past, when apprentices in many collegiate or trade guilds, after serving a lawful time, would be required to make a "prentice piece" to show that they had acquired the basic skills to allow them to work with less supervision, but still under the tutelage of a Master of the craft. Finally, when they had worked in the quarries and workshops long enough, they could submit a "Master's piece" (masterpiece.) This would be the pinnacle of their career in trade up to that point. In many cases, it would be evaluated by the other Masters, who would determine if the work was of high enough quality and showed enough promise that the maker should be considered a Master themselves.

If for no other reason than recognizing the work that candidates have put into their own establishment, we should be present and supportive of them. It's not the memorizing, or reciting, or even the learning that establishes them – it is being surrounded and supported by a community of Master Masons, who have walked the same roads and confronted the same challenges.

That is what makes them firm.

So, when you get the call to be active in Lodge as an officer or volunteer for some effort or participate in a degree (or, frankly, just to be there for it), I encourage you to do it. It's not just for your sake. It's to provide firmament to everyone else, not least of which the youngest Entered Apprentices and Fellowcrafts who are looking on and needing that support.
